FOREIGN OFFICE FILES FOR SOUTHEAST ASIA, 1963-1980

Cold War in the Pacific, Trade Relations, and the Post-Independence Period



Sourced from The National Archives, UK, this collection of British Foreign Office Files provides significant insight into the shifting political landscape of Southeast Asia from 1963-1980. Materials cover topics such as the formation of Malaysia, tensions between Indonesia and Malaysia, internal conflict, and development of trade and foreign policies.



POVERTY, PHILANTHROPY AND SOCIAL CONDITIONS IN VICTORIAN BRITAIN

This digital resource, including content from The Family Welfare Association Library, The National Archives, UK, and The British Library, documents the interactions between government policy and public philanthropy in Victorian and early twentieth-century society, tracing developments in welfare reform and the social tensions surrounding poverty.

The John Murray Publishing Archive

Offering unprecedented access to the peerless archive of the historic John Murray publishing company, this digital resource enables researchers to discover the golden age of the company that published genre-defining titles including Darwin's *On the Origin of Species*, Austen's *Emma*, and Livingstone's *Missionary Travels*. In addition, the resource makes available the most complete archival collection of Lord Byron, charting both literary triumph and personal scandal.



EARLY MODERN ENGLAND

Society, Culture and Everyday Life, 1500-1700

This collection of primary sources looks at two centuries of everyday, political, religious, working, trading and administrative life in England during this pivotal epoch. Documents cover an array of topics relating to England during the sixteenth and seventeenth centuries, with a significant focus on the lives of 'everyday' people. Materials are sourced from a range of archives including The National Archives, UK, the British Library, Shakespeare Birthplace Trust, and the Newberry Library.



MEDICAL SERVICES AND WARFARE

Module II: 1928-1949

This multi-archival resource, including content from Kings College London and The Museum of Military Medicine, documents a range of military medical developments which changed modern medicine and patient care from the post-war period to the mid-twentieth century. Collections show how the requirements of increasingly modern

warfare and the treatment of wounded soldiers brought about solutions which were later made available for civilian use. Materials cover a range of topics including the antibiotics age, psychiatry, plastic surgery, and the treatment of typhus, malaria and burns.

This digital resource provides access to a unique life-writing archive, capturing the everyday experiences, thoughts and opinions of people living through the turbulent final decades of the 20th century and the advent of the 21st century. Writing in response to directives, hundreds of Mass Observers provide a unique insight into an extraordinary range of subjects.



CHILDREN'S LITERATURE & CULTURE

Sourced from the American Antiquarian Society, this digital resource showcases a broad range of richly illustrated primary source material which reveals the history and literature of childhood between the 1820s and 1920s. Included in the resource is the McLoughlin Bros collection, a New York publishing firm that pioneered colour print technology in children's books during the first 'Golden Age' of children's literature.



FOOD & DRINK IN HISTORY

Module II

Continuing themes explored in Module I, the content in this second module spans five centuries, and offers a platform from which to study the historical links between food and identity, politics and power, gender, race, and socio-economic status. Sourced from archives including University of Michigan and the Brotherton Library at the University of Leeds, key topics covered include agriculture, sustainability, nutrition, food production, the Californian wine industry, the Irish Potato Famine, wartime rationing, African American cookbooks, and much more.



SEX & SEXUALITY

Module II: Self-Expression, Community and Identity

The second module from this collection, sourced from the Kinsey Institute Library & Special Collections, offers significant insight into the complex and myriad identities of human sexuality by making available official records of pressure groups and community organisations, diaries, correspondence, ephemera, papers of noted sexologists, and more. Topics covered by material include LGBTQI+ individual personal histories from the late-nineteenth century to the present day, accounts of grassroots organisations, self-expression in the form of diaries and correspondence, and the personal stories of LGBTQI+ activism.



EAST INDIA COMPANY

India Office Records, E: Correspondence - Early Voyages, Formation and Conflict

This digital resource provides access to volumes from Series E of the India Office Records

held by the British Library, the single most important archive for the study of the East India Company. The collection comprises correspondence between the East India Company, the Board of Commissioners for the Affairs of India, the Company's various settlements, and presidencies throughout Asia, British government departments and European houses of agency, interspersed with petitions, memorials and letters from individuals and lobby groups covering a diverse range of subjects.
